#### Annexure i

GOAL: The practice of collecting a share of meals from the students and teachers of the campus and distributing it the most needy category of the society is functioning quite smoothly in the campus for the past four years. This is done on a weekly basis to which more than 150 students and a large potion of the faculty wholeheartedly contribute their share. This aims to provide a lunch for the patients and needy ones in the nearby hospitals, asylums and old-age homes. A team of students and a member of the faculty sees to it that it is run quite effectively. This helps to inculcate in the student community the sense of social responsibility and a feel of concern for the helpless in the society.

PRACTICE: The staff and students of the college cares to carry a pack of lunch once in a week to the college. This is placed in a tray set apart for this sole purpose in the *Sharers' Room* of the college. On alternate Wednesdays and Thursdays, students and staff do place their share for this programme. This extends the bounds of education to the world outside. A team of students carries these food packets to the hospitals and other places.

#### Annexure ii

THE CONTEXT: The state of Kerala lacks self-sufficiency in vegetable production. If at all there is any amount produced, the chemical pesticide overused turn them all unhealthy. The chemical fertilizers and pesticides have almost diminished the farming culture in Kerala into a poisonous enterprise. Also the herbal garden wants to bring back the culture of growing medicinal plants in the front yard of the house. The same garden functioning as a butterfly garden sets one and the same garden as a seat of environmental convergence.

PRACTISE: After preparing a team of students, named *Vithakkoottam* which means the Sowing Army, we prepared them for the task of farming and maintaining the Organic Garden. Once in a week this team works in the field. They collect the regional seeds and sow them in the farm. Also they use cow dung, sheep droppings, ash, and many of the green manure available in the campus as well as its surroundings. The organic pesticides like the *pukayilakkashaayam* (tobacco cocentrate) Neem oil, and the cow urine are used in the garden. The team pays regular visits to the field and pays all due attention to the farming. The yield is collected and auctioned at times, the amount thus collected goes to the purchase of organic manure.
